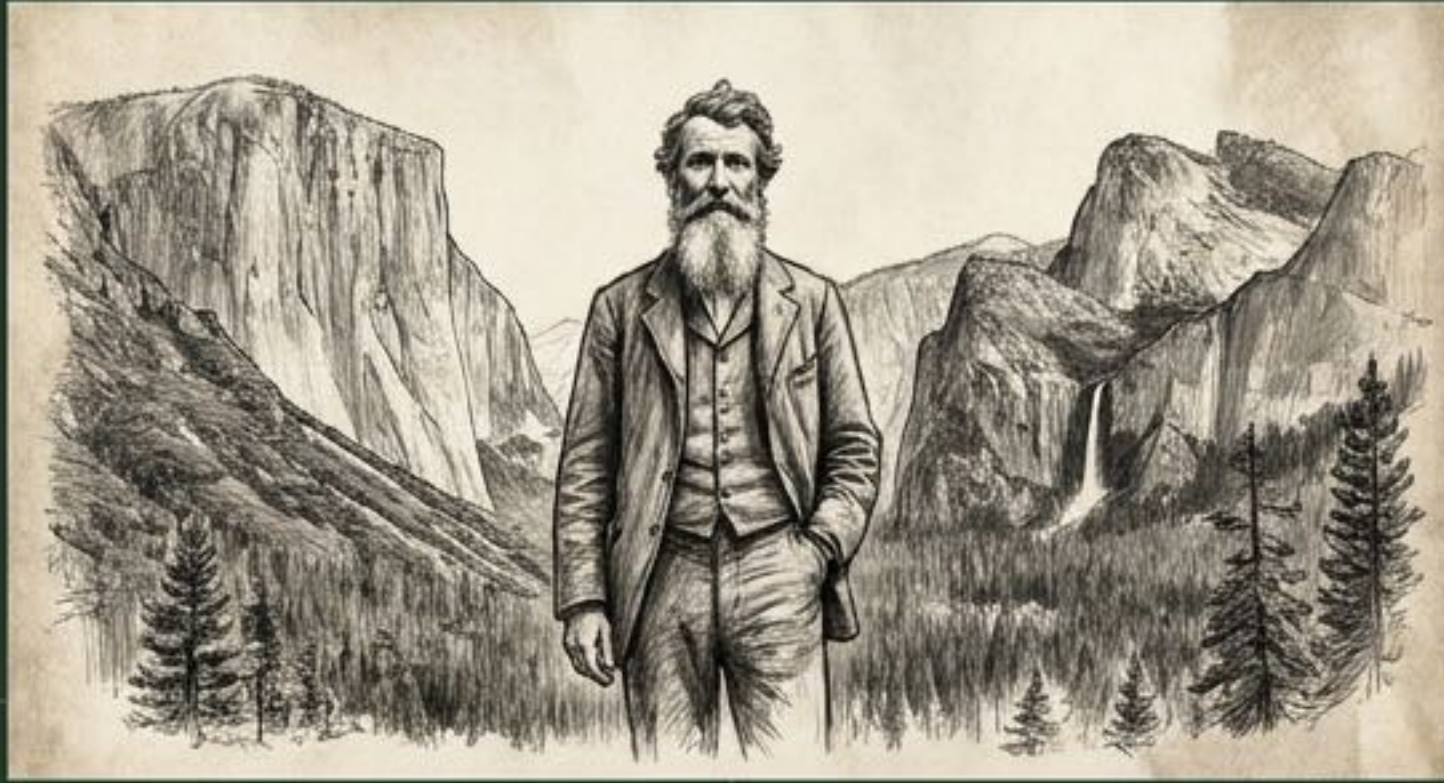
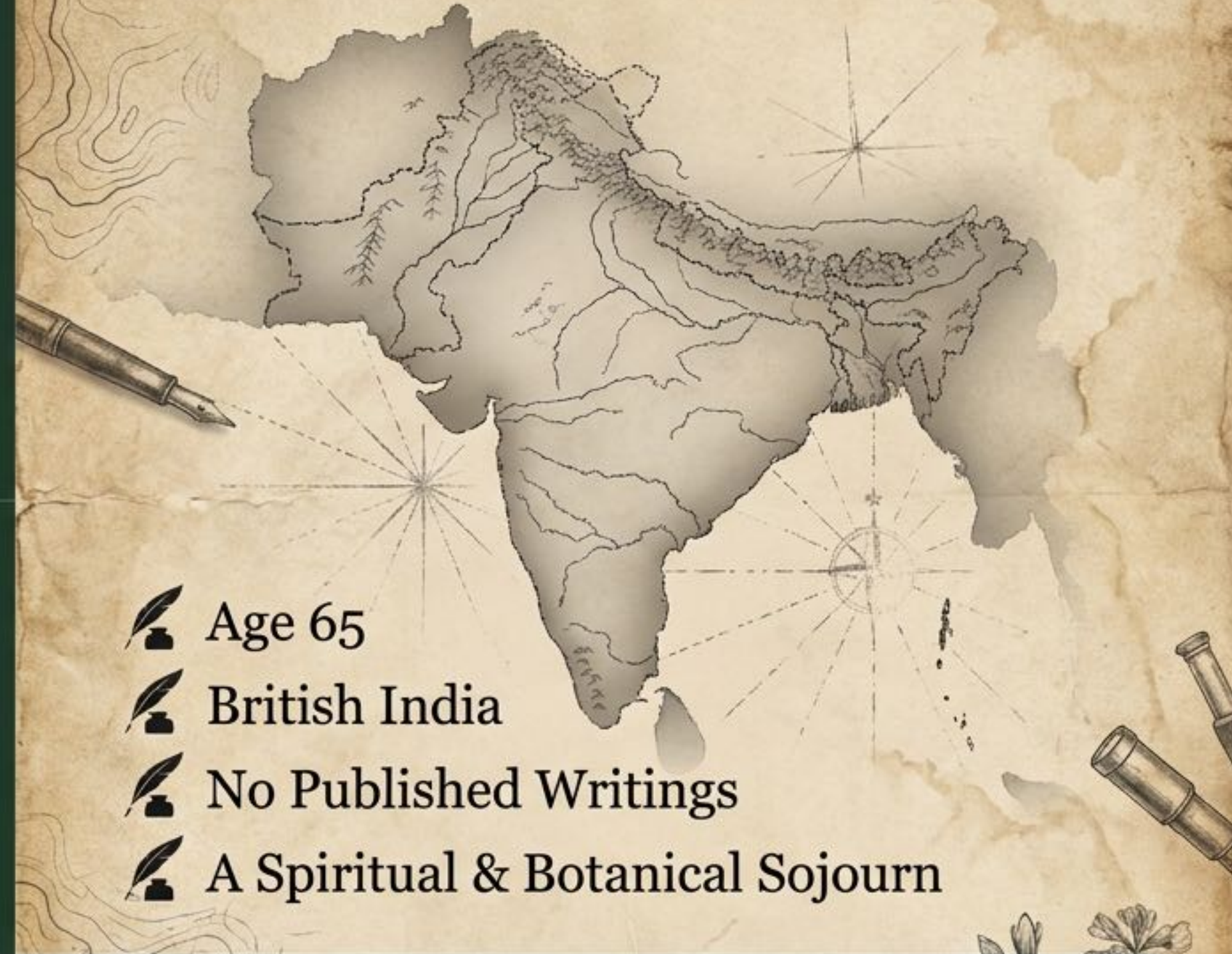

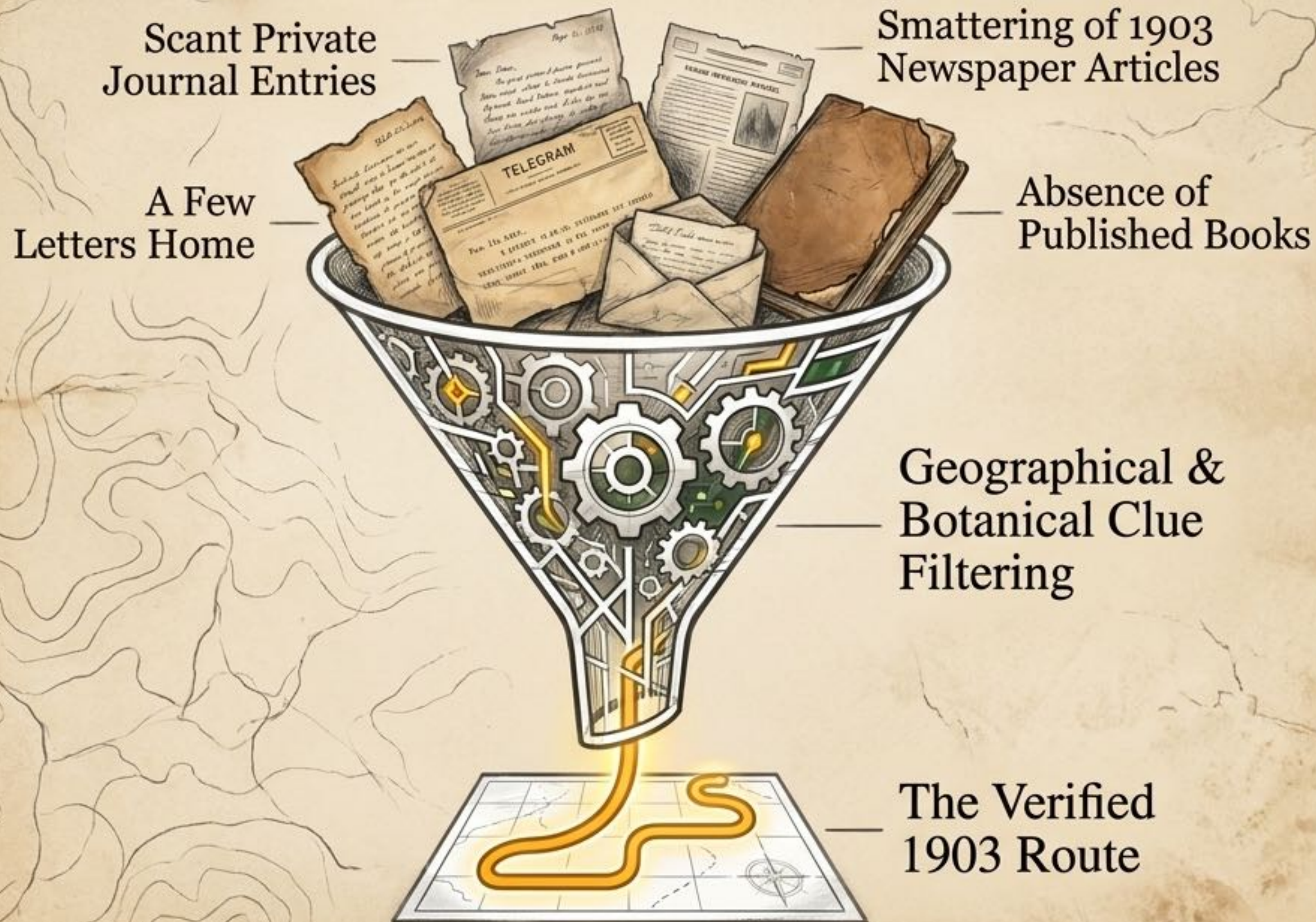
The 1903 Secret

Despite his growing global influence, Muir's month-long journey across the Indian subcontinent remains a largely undocumented void in his legacy. Until now.

The Evidence Funnel



Unlike his 1,000-Mile Walk to the Gulf, Muir wrote no books on India.

His private notes recorded hotel names, travel times, and passing encounters, requiring complex modern deduction to reconstruct the path.

The Route East



September 29, 1903:
Muir arrives in Calcutta
via the ship Bengala.

Stop 1: Royal Botanic
Garden. Exploring the
Great Banyan Tree.

Stop 2: Darjeeling.
Witnessing rolling
valleys, layered ridges,
and the shimmering
outlines of snowy
Himalayan peaks and
famous gardens.

Stop 3: Varanasi (Benares)
Observing vibrant ancient cultures and traditions along the famous Ghats.

Stop 4: Lucknow & Kanpur
Tracing the historical remnants of the 1857 sieges.

Stop 5: Agra
Experiencing the world-class majesty of the Taj Mahal.



The Peaks & Departure

Stop 6: Delhi

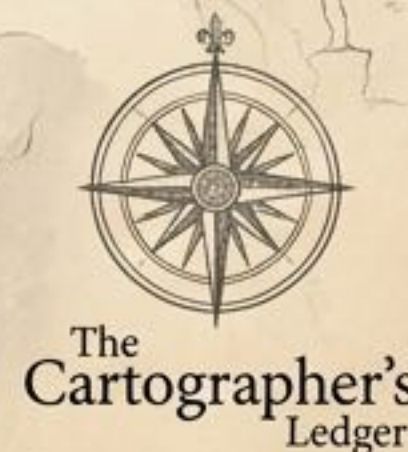
Exploring the ancient forts and gates.

Stop 7: Shimla

Muir's absolute favorite stop. Marvelling at the majestic Deodar trees and the snowy Kanchenjunga peaks.

Stop 8: Bombay (Mumbai)

The final departure point, concluding a month-long trans-continental sojourn.
